Vital and Veiled: Valerie Brathwaite and José Gabriel Fernández / ISLAA ARTIST SEMINAR INITIATIVE

Vital and Veiled: Valerie Brathwaite and José Gabriel Fernández / ISLAA ARTIST SEMINAR INITIATIVE WILL BE HELD AT UNIVERSITY GALLERIES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA (UF) FROM OCTOBER 27, 2023, TO JANUARY 26, 2024. THE EXHIBITION, CURATED BY KAIRA M. CABAÑAS AND JESÚS FUENMAYOR, IS THE SECOND EXHIBITION IN THE ISLAA ARTIST SEMINAR INITIATIVE / UF SERIES.

The Institute for Studies on Latin American Art (ISLAA) designed its Artist Seminar Initiative to support academic institutions in fostering intimate exchanges between students and living artists from Latin America. For the second iteration at University Galleries, the work of artists Valerie Brathwaite and José Gabriel Fernández informed the two-semester program of a curatorial seminar followed by an exhibition. Students in art history and museum studies programs took part in a seminar led by Kaira Cabañas in Spring 2023 and they will also serve as members of the curatorial advisory committee to the exhibition.

Vital and Veiled: Valerie Brathwaite and José Gabriel Fernández Highlights segments of each artist's most emblematic series: In the case of Valerie Brathwaite, her stones, flowers and "soft bodies" sculptures, which she has being creating since the late 1960's as a way of exploring sensuality in nature (or nature's sensuality). Her sculptures are made of different materials such as bronze, clay, ceramic, plaster, cement, or fabric, resulting in a unique hybridization of collage, painting and sculpture. Brathwaite's sculptures are imbued with a vitalism in her forms and choice of materials, contributing to the discussions around new materialism. In the case of José Gabriel Fernández, the exhibition focuses on his explorations of representations of masculinity and veiled homoerotism in tauromaquia (bullfighting), which he initiated in the mid 1990's, including his "studies" of the capote (bullfighter's cape) as a generative shape for his ultra-modern sculptures. His work marries a keen aesthetic sophistication with veiled references to sexuality and thus contributes to expanded narratives on queer art.

Each artist explored their own path for developing an exploration of sensuality through sculptural experimentation and print media. What is more, it is important to note that they each question how artistic practice relates to a specific identity, which they began exploring before identity politics in contemporary art emerged. Their decades-long dedication to this type of aesthetic investigation provides the foundation for an in-depth discussion for other conversations related to contemporary art, art from Latin America and the Caribbean, and current curatorial discourses.

Vital and Veiled is complemented by two additional exhibitions from the [On View: Curatorial Studies | Series. The first one is Valerie Brathwaite. Works on Paper, curated by Macarena Deij Prado, OPEN TO THE PUBLIC AT THE GARY R. LIBBY FOCUS GALLERY FROM SEPTEMBER 21 TO NOVEMBER 18, 2023. THE SECOND ONE, José Gabriel Fernández. A Brief History of Drawing, CURATED BY CAIT MOHR, WILL BE ON VIEW FROM JANUARY 12 - 27, 2024. For the exhibition at the G.R.L. Focus Gallery, Brathwaite is presenting A SERIES OF HISTORICAL DRAWINGS, MOST OF THEM FROM THE 1970S, WHERE SHE EXPLORES HER IDEAS OF AN INNER LANDSCAPE AND THE EXPANDED POSSIBILITIES OF DRAWING, LIKE INCORPORATING THE SUPPORT (THE PAPER) AS INTEGRAL PART OF THE WORK, WHERE LINES AND FORMS COEXIST IN A CONTINUOUS STATE OF METAMORPHOSIS AND INFINITE EXPLORATION OF THE PICTURE PLANE. FERNÁNDEZ WILL SHOW, AS MOHR EXPLAINS, "A SERIES OF SEVEN 'ACTION DRAWINGS' TITLED Pequeño Manual de Dibujo, OR, 'LITTLE DRAWING HANDBOOK, DISRUPTING NOTIONS OF ARTISTIC DIDACTICISM AND EUCLIDIAN GEOMETRY THROUGH THE INTRODUCTION OF CERTAIN 'EVENTS' INTO THE DRAWING PRACTICE SUCH AS BURNING. PREFIGURING A LATER INTEREST IN THE INTERPLAY OF LIGHT AND SHADOW, Pequeño Manual de Dibujo MAKES EVIDENT THE TENSIONS BETWEEN MATERIALITY AND ILLUSION, EPHEMERALITY AND PERMANENCE. THE ACTIONS ARE DOCUMENTED THROUGH A SERIES OF DISSOLVING SLIDE PROJECTIONS RANGING FROM Drawing #1 to Drawing #7, LOOPING CONTINUOUSLY.

A fully-illustrated catalogue with contributions by the curators, and essays by Luis Pérez Oramas and Rachel Silveri will be published by University Galleries.
